

Deep syntactic relations (tectogrammatics)

Tectogrammatical representation (TR) of the sentence

- (1) When they moved closer, they saw two white horses at the back-ground of dark bushes.
- dependency relations
- discourse relations
- coreference




Information structure

Preceding context:

One Saturday afternoon the children walked along Turkey river.

Values of information structure added to the TR of (1):

- ► t = contextually bound
- ► c = contrastive contextually bound
- ► **f** = contextually non-bound




Coreference and bridging

The beauty began to walk upstream. Her head became a cooly glooming torch. She stretched.

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

Discourse relations



Discourse segment:

The master stopped rowing. At the same time, Rusalka's scream fell silent. Instead, a sincere "Oh, damn it, John!" came from the waterlily.

- grammatical coreference
- ► textual coreference
- ► range: scope of arguments, range 0>0 = relation holds between arguments represented only by trees where discourse arrow begins and ends

discourse relation conj

- Conjunction (connective at the same time = translation of Czech rovněž (as well, lit. equally) which has in this context conjunction meaning, one event and also another one happened)
- discourse relation corr
 - correction (connective instead =
 translation of Czech misto toho
 (instead of that), some event is
 replaced by another)

CASE STUDIES

Coherence disruption (work in progress)

Weak coherence and coherence disruptions

How is coherence established in cases where:

- ▶ no explicit or implicit discourse relation is present,
- ▶ no coreferential or bridging relation is present?

New types of relations

(not annotated yet):

- text organizing devices:
 - e.g. title text
- ► attribution:
 - source of information
 - information We extract from the decisive arrangements:

Until March 31 the procedure runs

. . .

question - answer
Is the government going to follow
its original plans? Yes.

Reader's expectation as coherence factor:

- ► thematic continuity: e.g. list of events following the title: *Week* among computers
- ▶ genre rules: e.g. a standardized weather report enumerating location, days etc.
- ► reconstruction of ellipses The state spends 1,6 1,8 % of GDP on the support of small enterprise. (Subtitle) Regional aspects [deleted: on the support]

Salience

(1) Across the river Magda and Kovarik could now see a fire with two figures beside it. (2) When they moved closer, (3) they could make out two white horses against the background of the dark bushes. . . (11) He looked at Magda.
